Finding accommodation can be one of the most challenging aspects of the Study Abroad process. How do you safely find somewhere affordable and liveable in an unfamiliar location?



Then you can get back to what really matters: making plans and looking forward to your new overseas adventure!

University Accommodation

Many partner universities offer campus accommodation, some guaranteed, others on a first-come-first-served basis. Applying for campus accommodation is the easiest option and will vary from residence halls to shared flats. It is also the safest option as you will be protected from accommodation scams and rogue landlords, so we recommend university housing where possible. Costs usually include utilities (gas, electricity, water, internet), but halls are still likely to be the more expensive option. N.B. Most universities will provide a list of approved providers for private rentals: using these is highly advisable to avoid scams.

University Halls - PROs:



- Good for making friends: immediate access to lots of students (depending on the university, your room may be double occupancy).
- Safe, secure and supportive: you will have a genuine contract; you may benefit from campus security; there may be access to pastoral care, such as counselling and disability services.
- Accommodation usually comes furnished so you don't have to buy furniture and can save your money for fun trips.
- Student halls are usually in close proximity to campus, so you can save money walking to lectures, rather than getting a bus.



University Halls - CONs:



- Can be expensive: it's worth comparing with other options and checking your budget first, as with many halls there are additional costs, such as meal plans, included in the price.
- No guarantee of choices: you might not get a place in your preferred accommodation.
- Not 'your own space': you're sharing with many others, which means there will probably be extra noise and mess!
- University halls can sometimes be quite restrictive in terms of curfews and guests.
- Roommates: you will not get to choose your roommate, so if your university offers double occupancy, you need to be comfortable with this.

Guaranteed University Accommodation

Below we have listed our partners that generally guarantee on-campus accommodation for exchange students (but please check information from your host university as this can change from year to year). If you have been nominated to one of these universities, you will generally apply for housing as part of your application.

Our other partners will offer campus accommodation and these can also be applied for at the time of application, but it will be allocated on a first-come-firstserved basis. If our partners do not offer campus accommodation, then you will need to seek your own private housing.



Renting Privately

Finding student accommodation in your own city can be tough, not to mention a completely unfamiliar city that you are yet to actually step foot in. With various rules and regulations to get your head around, it's undoubtedly daunting, so we have come up with a few important things to consider when searching for private accommodation.

1 DO YOUR RESEARCH

You have confirmed your place at your university, you know what city you will be moving to, but aside from that, you probably have no idea what the neighbourhoods are like: Are they safe? Are they student-friendly? Which locations are actually affordable? It is important to do as much research as possible! Make the effort to consume as much information about your new city as possible; watch city tours, read guides! It is also worth contacting the accommodation office at your host university as they may be able to provide information on neighbourhoods, approved landlords and how much you can expect to pay for rent in the area. Beware of landlords who are not approved by your host university and avoid rentals that you cannot verify, e.g. advertised on social media!

2 WORK OUT YOUR BUDGET

You need to be realistic on how much you can afford to spend on rent each month to allow you to work out how much you will have left for utility bills, public transport, food and luxuries. Working out your budget carefully will narrow down your accommodation choices as some properties will align with your budget better than others. Also consider that you may need to pay deposits before you receive your student finance!

3 BE PATIENT

Finding the perfect accommodation abroad within the first few days of searching is unlikely! Advertisers offering rooms can get inundated with messages, so they may not respond right away, so be prepared for your search to take a few weeks.

4 BE CAUTIOUS

Social media is a great way to get a feel for where you will be living, but if someone offers you a room, be cautious: unfortunately, there are many bogus landlords and scammers. Keep in mind that if it looks too good to be true, it probably is! Stick to searching on reliable accommodation websites and landlords approved by your partner university (ask them for a list of approved providers).

5 BE RESOURCEFUL

Where possible, we recommend viewing a property in person before accepting. However, you may need to secure accommodation in advance, for visa purposes, for example, especially for some European countries now that the UK has left the EU. In these cases, ask the landlord to send you some photos or to organise a Skype tour of the property. Ask lots of questions, such as:

- By what method does the landlord require the rent to be paid?
- Does the rent include bills?
- Have they rented before (particularly to international students)?
- Are there any deposits or non-refundable fees? What are they? (Request a refundable deposit where possible)
- What is their sub-letting policy?
- Do they allow early contract terminations? If so, what are the fees?
- Will you be able to renew the contract if you want to?
- Are guests allowed to stay?
- Are there any additional rules to be aware of?

Also look at our Housing checklist on the next page to help you think about the area, location and practicalities.

You may decide to conduct your search once in your host Country, which is preferable (but not always possible) as you can take advantage of local noticeboards or ask local students for recommendations

Make sure you factor this into your plans, travel earlier and book a hostel or hotel but check that you are covered by UoM and your own insurance.

Remember to check whether proof of accommodation is a requirement of your visa, including for EU countries!
Remember: if you end up in horrible accommodation on the other side of the world, you won't be able to just go home. Ultimately, it will seriously affect your time abroad, so do all that you can to ensure you know exactly what you're going into!

Advertising Your Room

Top tips for what your advert should include to attract tenants:

- State that you are looking for a replacement tenant
- Include a description of the room/ property, e.g.room in a shared house, city, neighbourhood
- Location Give a full description e.g. quiet street, plenty of parking, centre of town, local shops nearby, excellent public transport links
- Rental list the weekly/monthly rental price, what bills are included and what is not
- Tenancy List how long you are looking for someone to take on the tenancy agreement
- Who the room is most suited for, e..g. male/ female, smoker/non-smoker
- Furnished or unfurnished clearly list what is included (properties on the MSH website are all fully furnished)
- Include photos if you can searchers like to see photos



However, accommodation is not guaranteed. Germany

Freie Universitat Berlin: University housing is offered to exchange students, though most do not apply as the dorms are situated some distance from campus. Housing is cheap and plentiful in Berlin, but it is over-subscribed, so be prepared to see many apartments before moving in.

Remember to make the best first impression that you can when viewing a room; be polite and friendly. The best website to use is wggesucht, although Facebook groups are also very good.

Freiburg Universitat: Limited

accommodation is offered to exchange students. You should also apply for the larger housing run by the Student's Union (Studierendenwerk). You may also opt for private rental. Hungary

ELTE: Exchange students are not guaranteed accommodation. You can apply to student residence halls but some are far from campus, so you may prefer to find private accommodation. Start your search early as the rental market is limited and competitive:


Alternatively, many students wish to find privately rented accommodation in Canberra. Give yourself plenty of time to do this before the beginning of the teaching period. Guidance for renting privately is on ANU's website:https://housingonline.anu.edu.au/

University of Melbourne: The on-campus housing system is based on the collegiate model found at institutions such as Oxford and Cambridge. As such, each separate college has a distinct character and unique atmosphere.

Places are limited, so the earlier you apply the better. Research the different options here: http://www.colleges.unimelb.edu.au and here: https://study.unimelb.edu.au/accommodation

Of course, privately rented accommodation is also a viable option in Melbourne. The University's Global Mobility Office (MGM) has a dedicated member of staff to help exchange students with their housing queries.



University of Western Australia: Again, UWA operates a collegiate system giving a unique educational environment. Be advised that spaces are limited - you need to apply early in order to have a good chance of being accepted into halls.

UWA provide a mixture of unfurnished accommodation for students who do not wish to live in-college, details of which can be found on their website. As ever, privately rented accommodation is an available and popular option for UWA students.

Due to the shortage of University-housing, the residential areas which surround Queen's University are inhabited almost exclusively by students, earning them the nickname 'Kingston's Student Ghetto'. These areas have a national reputation for providing a truly unique student experience. 
The Hebrew University of Jersualem:

Universidad de las Americas: UDLAP offers on-campus housing to all students. There are 4 residential colleges: Cain Murray, Ray Lindley, Ignacio Bernal and José Gaos. Dorms are divided into suites with 4-8 students sharing. All suites are equipped with a shared kitchen, living area, toilet/shower facilities, and a washer/dryer. Students may choose to stay in a private or shared room. The colleges aim to create a strong community environment for students and to widen their cultural experience. 



- Rent from a trusted landlord or company.
- · Speak to a Global Guidance Ambassador.
- Talk to returned or inbound study abroad students about where they stayed.

- Carefully consider what you want from your accommodation and what your priorities are.
- Make sure there are no hidden costs.
- Don't pay for anything without seeing it first (or request a virtual tour).
- Carefully read your contract, ask for it to be translated or ask a native speaker to read it where applicable.
- · Be open minded: you might not get exactly what you want, so be flexible!
