### **Online resources**

In particular, spend some time exploring the website of your host institution/organisation, especially any pages set up specifically for exchange students that you can find, or introductory information for new employees.

Download any handbooks for exchange/international students that you can find, or introductory information for new employees.

Familiarise yourself with the course offerings of the University/structure of the company.

Look into things like sports facilities, any medical facilities, accommodation provision, health & safety guidelines etc.

Some partners/organisations will have much better websites than others, so you may need some patience when navigating through the information! Other sites worth looking at include:

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### **My Placement**

Your Study and Work Abroad activities will be managed through My Placement, which is a University-wide system that can be accessed through My Manchester or at **studentmobility.manchester.ac.uk** – here you will find copies of all of the documents that you will need to download and complete, and you will also be able to submit these documents through questionnaires. There are also many other resources to support your time abroad.

My Placement enables you to keep all of your study and work abroad documentation in one safe place, and also allows staff supporting you to review this and act on it as required. You will use My Placement at every stage of your study and work abroad experience – from applying right through to returning to Manchester – and will log in using your normal University username and password.

My Placement is also used for checking in upon arrival at your placement, Progress & Wellbeing checks, and in case of any emergencies. One of the most important pieces of information in

My Placement is your itinerary – where you will be while abroad and how long for – this is normally updated for you by the member of staff managing your placement either in your School or in the International Programmes Office. If there are any changes to this (if you are planning on going abroad for longer than you initially thought, or your placement shortens for any reason) then it's really important that you let your placement co-ordinator know as soon as possible so that they can update this for you.

A dedicated brochure has been compiled for most partner universities which includes helpful and practical information such as (but not limited to):

- The cost of living (so you can plan your finances properly).
- Information about both university and private accommodation at your destination.
- How and where to apply for a visa (if necessary).
- Semester dates and the academic calendar for your destination.
- Contacts for a range of student support services at your destination.
- Feedback from previous students.

Furthermore, the brochure contains lots of links to vitally important sections of your host institution's website such as: course catalogues and grading systems. There are also links to relevant third party websites, local travel guides or accommodation forums, for example.

Your application homepage will also be the place where you can find any important documents or requirements relating to your time abroad. These will be updated throughout your placement

Check your application homepage regularly both in Manchester and whilst abroad.
